As the current Community Outreach and Events Director for the Graduate and Professional Student Senate (GPSS), I have had the privilege of working directly under the Vice President of Internal Affairs this past year. Through this role, I have provided hands-on support in organizing many of the impactful events hosted by GPSS. My experience has given me a deep understanding of the university's event policies, from room bookings and required permits, to the various platforms we use for event planning. I am confident navigating these logistics and know what is needed to ensure events run smoothly and in compliance with university guidelines.

In addition to my role, I have actively collaborated with the Vice President of Administration and the Vice President of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, supporting their projects and helping to ensure that all GPSS initiatives are well-executed and inclusive. I've regularly attended Senate meetings, contributed to the Diversity Committee, and been present at nearly every GPSS event—tabling, helping behind the scenes, and stepping in wherever needed.
